- Early dismissal for Student Learning Conferences (Parent/Teacher Conferences)
 which were held on March 5th and 6th
- RSS Music concerts were on March 12th and 13th and were big successes
- Assemblies to explain the new Digital Device Policy were held on March 12th.
 - o Greg Kenyon also provided an update as to how it is going.
 - The grade 12's are finding it the most difficult to comply during spares.
 Students like to do class work on spares and like to go to teachers blogs for class work.
 - Devices are only allowed during the lunch hour in specific areas within the school and outside of school grounds. Otherwise, they need to be in their lockers.
 - It was brought to Greg's attention that there are a lot of QR codes on posters in the school (to register for sports teams etc.) that are in areas where students are not allowed to use their devices so he will look into moving the posters and giving other options for students.
 - Another parent brought up that the new policy also makes individuals who have support needs requiring digital devices (laptop, iPhones, iPads) stick out which can make some kids feel uncomfortable.
- Student Learning Survey was completed post Spring Break.
 - Follow-up sessions occurred as RSS tries to get the best data possible for school planning purposes.
- Earth Day activities on April 16th were organized by the RSS Sustainability Club (Earth Fair)
- Term 3 ended on April 11th
- The track team, seniors' girls' soccer team, junior girls' soccer team and the mountain biking team are all into their seasons.
- Golf has been put on the back burner this year as it is very expensive for students (even with support from the district).
- School wide lunch was held before spring break
 - The next will be held on June 14th which will be the last Friday of regular classes.
- Parent shared concerns around groups targeting youth around far right extremist movements (white power).

- These groups are not specifically targeting Revelstoke kids, but they are reaching them.
- There have been hand signs and haircuts that have shown up in school photos, as well as student language supporting this ideology.
- o Some kids as young as 9 years old
- Discussed bringing in RCMP speakers to come to RSS to speak on this topic.
- Also, preventing certain sites from being accessed through school computers.
- Funding requests: New Mascot Costume (was approved with the request that a Canadian company be used if there is one).
 - Also approved was a \$300.00 PAC Ad for the yearbook.
